Understanding Financial Aid

Part-time vs. Full-time Enrollment

Navigating the world of financial aid can be complex, especially when considering whether to enroll as a part-time or full-time student. This handout aims to provide clarity on the differences between financial aid options for part-time and full-time students, helping you make informed decisions about your education.

Different Types or Financial Aid			
Loans	Grants and Scholarships	Work-Study Programs	
Federal and private loans are often available to both part-time and full-time students, but eligibility and terms may vary.	These are typically available to both part-time and full-time students and do not need to be repaid.	These programs provide part- time employment opportunities for students to help cover educational expenses.	

	Part-Time Enrollment (1-11 credits)	Full-Time Enrollment (12+ credits)
Financial Aid Eligibility:	Part-time students may still be eligible for various forms of financial aid, including grants, scholarships, and loans, but the amount may be prorated based on enrollment status.	Full-time students typically have access to a wider range of financial aid options, and aid packages may cover a larger portion of your educational expenses.
Flexibility:	Part-time enrollment allows students to balance work, family, and other commitments while pursuing their education.	Full-time enrollment allows students to complete their degree requirements more quickly, potentially reducing overall educational costs.
Impact on Aid:	Some types of financial aid, such as Pell Grants and federal student loans, may be reduced for part-time students compared to full-time students.	Some scholarships and grants may require full-time enrollment as a condition of eligibility.
	Important note: The loan amounts will not be automatically reduced. It is recommended to budget your expenses and limit the amount of loans.	

Things to consider when choosing your Enrollment Status:

- **Financial Need:** Evaluate your financial situation and consider whether part-time or full-time enrollment is more feasible given your resources and obligations.
- Academic Goals: Consider your academic goals and how your enrollment status may impact your ability to achieve them within your desired timeline.
